A Tacoma Daily Ledger article describes the house as having "...eight rooms, four above and four below. Each floor has an open fireplace..." The main floor was "...finished on the interior in mission style and the wood used is slash-grain fir, stained golden oak." Other notable features of the house were the "fuel-lift from the basement", a clothes chute, and a second floor bathroom which was "usually large. The residence was completed at a final cost of \$5,500. W.A. Stewart was born in Puyallup in 1867. He served as county auditor and deputy county auditor for several terms. Stewart died suddenly in 1920 while working at the county courthouse. He and his wife Elizabeth had two daughters. Margaret and Virginia.
