Description: A 2 1/2 story, single-family residence designed in the American Foursquare Style. The main roof is hipped with a gabled dormer over the front. There is an eight-over-one window flanked by two, multi-paned windows in the dormer. There is a brick chimney to the right edge. At the second level, there are square oriels with windows projecting out at the left and right sides. There are six-over-one windows in the oriels. In the center of the second level are two six-over-one windows. There is a shed-roofed bay to the right side, and there are four nine-over-one windows, ganged in the bay. The entrance is sheltered by a hipped porch roof, supported on square columns. There is a large nine-over-one window to the left side. The structure is clad in wood shingles.

Cultural Data: Home of William A. Stewart, chief deputy, County Auditor. The residence was estimated to cost \$3,600. A Tacoma Daily Ledger article describes the house as having "...eight rooms, four above and four below. Each floor has an open fireplace..." The main floor was "...finished on the interior in mission style and the wood used is slash-grain fir, stained golden oak." Other notable features of the house were the "fuel-lift from the basement", a clothes chute, and a second floor bathroom which was "usually large. The residence was completed at a final cost of \$5,500. W.A. Stewart was born in Puyallup in 1867. He served as county auditor and deputy county auditor for several terms. Stewart died suddenly in 1920 while working at the county courthouse. He and his wife Elizabeth had two daughters, Margaret and Virginia. S. L. Blair, architect and contractor. 1906
