Historic District Expansion Sent to City Council

On September 3, Tacoma's Planning Commission sent the proposed expansion of the North Slope Historic District on to the City Council for consideration. The first reading to the City Council is tentatively set for October 21. Official notification will be coming from the City.

The Historic District currently consists only of North J Street, from North 3rd to Steele Street. The expansion would include both sides of I Street, and K, L & M Streets. This area was chosen for inclusion because it surrounds North J Street, as well as for the Landmarks Commission's rationale for establishing a historic district.

The reasons are outlined by Valerie Sivinski, Historic Preservation Officer for the City. They include:

1. The area consists of predominantly residential properties, dating back to the 1890s.

2. The community was settled irregularly over its history in a fairly dense residential pattern and it is not uncommon to find structures from the 1890s next to houses built in the 1940s.

3. The residents represented a complete cross section of different classes and occupations, from a U.S. ambassador to France, to high school principals, and policemen.

4. The architectural characteristics are also variable, although there are a number of architect-designed houses in the neighborhood. After the Great Depression another building boom took place with considerably smaller single family brick residences in simple forms and two or three story multi-family apartment complexes.

Our North Slope neighborhood is unique and should be granted Historic District status. Help make this a reality by attending the reading on October 21. If you have questions about the Historic District or need a ride to the reading, please call Julie Turner, North Slope Historic District Expansion Coordinator at 383-2329.

If enough signatures are obtained, this will complete the Historie District to include all streets of the North Slope Neighborhood. It would be a great feather in our cap to have our North Slope area designated as the first Historic District in the City!

Citizen's Patrol/Crime Watch

On August 27, 12 volunteers attended a Citizens Patrols orientation at the Bayarian Restaurant and three other volunteers attended a subsequent orientation. With these new members, the Patrol now has a total of 19 members who, since September 1, have dedicated themselves to conducting either vehicle or walking patrols at least one day per month. An additional three members who were active last year have volunteered to participate on an irregular basis. Seven more patrolees are waiting, patiently I hope, to attend an orientation.

With the new members active and with those standing in the wings, we are now well on our way to achieving the goal of having at least one patrol out every day of the month. To attain this goal, however, we still need more volunteers. Please consider committing yourself to an hour or hour and a half each month to make your community a better place to live. 
Our ultimate goal is to have more than one patrol out every day. Of course, attainment of this goal is contingent upon getting additional patrol equipment, particularly telephones, and additional committed volunteers. As far as equipment goes, the Tacoma Police Department is helping us to obtain two additional cell phones with free air time from the Community Policing Consortium of Washington, DC. If provided, we will have the ability to put up to three patrols out daily. Such visibility in our community will, I'm sure, really contribute to a reduction in adverse incidents in our neighborhood. But additional equipment alone won't do the job, more volunteers are needed as well.

Please consider committing to giving your neighborhood a couple of hours a month.

Last year, on a beautiful August summer evening, many of us had our lives shattered when our dear friend Officer Richard Washington suffered a fatal heart attack.

For those of us who had become friends with this very special man, it was a horrible shock and we felt a hole in our lives. To know Richard was to love him and he was special beyond words. It was also a terrible shock to the Tacoma Police Department. Richard was well liked and respected and he loved being a police officer.

Richard left a wife and three teenage children and they, too have suffered a terrible loss. We ache for them and remember their loved one on the anniversary of his death.

This year, on another beautiful August evening, I returned from Harborview Hospital again (Richard was also at Harborview) after spending time with the family and friends of Officer William Lowry, who was killed that morning in the

line of duty. He left a wife and baby daughter, who had her first birthday the weekend before he was killed. Though I did not have the pleasure of knowing this fine man, I began to know the very essence of his life, after spending time with his family and friends. I know that he was a very loving and caring husband, father, son, brother, friend, employee, officer....

This is a great blow to the fellow officers that Bill Lowry worked with. Many of them left the cemetery service to go back to work, and it brings home the reality that this could happen to any of them. As Richard's widow, Katherine Washington, said to me, "I do not believe that the common citizens understand that these guys know that they may have to give their lives in the performance of their jobs, their lives may be taken from them on their next call."

How many of us would be willing to work in a job that has the potential to be so risky, you may be verbally abused, physically assaulted, and constantly looked upon with mistrust and often hated for what you do?

I am thankful for our Police Department and appreciate the job that they are doing in Tacoma. In this last year they have lost two of their finest officers, and yet there are others who will continue on, who will respond to our homes and businesses under the worst of conditions, doing what they are called to do, to serve and protect with excellence and sometimes personal sacrifice.

Doll Making Classes Offered

When my husband and I first saw our 1890 Queen Anne Victorian house at 414 North J Street, I was especially excited about the attic. Here was the perfect place for a doll studio. The attic, except for the addition of lights and heat, is basically the same as it was when it was built for Frederick Low in 1890. The walls, ceiling and turret room of the 1200 square foot attic are raw wood, exposing the craftsmanship of long ago.

I have been a porcelain dollmaker since 1992 when I was captivated by the beauty and lifelike quality of porcelain dolls. Porcelain dollmaking was a booming industry in France and Germany from 1880-1910. The beautiful antique dolls of Bru, Jumeau, Kestner, Heubach, etc. are legendary. Knowing that I could never afford a \$60,000 antique Bru, I have tried to reproduce its beauty. Over the last six years I have studied with the best dollmakers in the country from Vancouver B.C. to New York. Last

July in Onconta, New York, I received two blue ribbons at an international competition and received my Master of Dollmaking credential. The dolls I entered were reproductions of French dolls from the golden age of dollmaking, 1880-1895.

I would love to share my love of dollmaking with you. Ongoing classes will be held Wednesday evenings 7:30-9:00. The studio will be open Wednesdays from 7:00-9:30 p.m. I will be teaching dollmaking using the best materials and techniques available. I have over 60 antique and modern dolls you can choose from. Greenware, paints, brushes, and supplies are available. I am offering a beginner's project for \$29.95 that includes everything you need to complete a beautiful 18" baby doll with porcelain head, hands, and the cutest feet. The weekly class fee is \$7.00.
