Over 40 people from the community came to ask questions and hear about the latest activity and programs that working to make our neighborhood healthier. The Tacoma Police Department hosted the meeting and there were five officers in attendance that represented our area - Lt. Fisk, CLO officers Gill and Stark, and two bicycle patrol officers.

Problems at the Red Maple Apartments are being addressed, there was talk of a grant to address the car thief, and Safe Streets is working with Jason Lee Middle School. Many thoughts were expressed and answers about future

action were given.

Scam of the Month Alert: The following is a scam going on around the country right now. A person calls your house and says they are an AT&T Technician conducting a test on your telephone line. He/she says that to complete the test, you should touch "9", "zero", "pound sign" (#) and then hang up.

According to the phone company, if you push 90#, you give the requesting individual full access to your telephone line, which allows them to place a long distance call billed to your home phone number. Apparently this scam has been emanating from local jails. The scam artist will not always say they are calling from AT&T. It could be any number of different phone companies. If you get such a call, hang up immediately and report it to your phone company.

A Kinder, Gentler Era

Our neighborhood is the only residential historic district in the city of Tacoma. The requirements and procedures for getting historic status are long and demanding. This ensures that a majority of property owners are truly in favor of our special status and it is not just an act of whimsy.

The North Slope Historic District is a fascinating mix of homes from many eras and economic classes. The wealthy capitalists are represented by large, showy mansions; the bottom end laborer by small, simple cottages. Most homes in the district are rooted in Tacoma's industrial past: the working class. From street to street, house to house, the history of Tacoma and the history of the Northwest is told.

Some people seem to think of the historic district as an area where time is standing still, where nothing new is allowed. That is not correct. As long as humans are involved, there will be change. New construction is allowed, as is remodeling and renovation. All the historic district asks is that the new construction and changes respect the style and aesthetics of the neighborhood. New construction does not have to look Victorian.

What is the purpose of all this hard work and self regulation? Why bother?

Roots, compass, authenticity.

Roots: A place where we belong,

a home. A place where the family prospers. After all, the family is the first and basic human institution.

Compass: The historic district is a record of where we have been as a society. The neighborhood is a form of social record keeping. You have to know where you've been to know where you want to end up.

Authenticity: American society is getting faster, louder, dumber. Our lives are bombarded by synthetic stimulus of fast food, violent entertainment, sports and news, architecture without human scale, and the media – all at warp speed.

Our historic neighborhood was created in a gentle time. The neighborhood invited a walk to visit the neighbors, to relax, to stroll. We need the historic neighborhood now as a place to fall back, relax, charge our batteries in the authenticity of human contact, scale and rhythm.


