We are particularly interested in homes in the upper North Slope area (Job Carr's farm property).



Historic District Expansion, Part 2

Have you received a notice letting you know of the date for the hearing before the Planning Commission? What hearing, you may ask? This is the public hearing before the Planning Commission—the second of the three required public process hearings.

In September, Elizabeth Anderson, Historic Preservation Officer, presented the North Slope Historic District expansion to the Planning Commission and requested a date for the public hearing. There was



no public participation at that particular meeting, but some hardy souls attended to show continued interest. (If you feel left out, it's because I didn't meet up with you to beg your attendance. You are not safe at the grocery market, any parking lot, or office!)

The Planning Commission has accepted the possibility of the proposed expansion and set the hearing date for **October 6**. We need to attend the hearing! If you have small children, it's fun to bring them. No one objects to knowing that young families actually live in the North Slope neighborhood!

Crime-Free Housing Seminars

Tacoma has been offering a 15 hour class on crime-free housing for property managers of single family, small multi-plex rentals, and larger apartments. The monthly program has three parts: training that helps owners and managers reduce criminal activity; site evaluation principles that reduce physical risks; and tenant education focusing on crime and safety.

The program works to support efforts to eliminate criminal activity and blight through code enforcement and community pride. The next class will be October 19 and 20, 9 a.m.-5 p.m. each day at the Russell Conference Center, 1321 Martin Luther King, Jr. Way. There is a \$45 fee for the class.

November's session will be held on the 16 & 17. If you own or manage rentals and are interested in the program, phone Mary Beth Riggs, 591-5160 for registration or further information.

Community Police Meeting

Update on Mini-Casinos in Tacoma

The Tacoma City Council will be considering a ban or approval on mini-casinos. Seven licenses are pending for enhanced social card room mini-casinos. One is already open, on 6th Avenue.

They can remain open 20 hours a day. Licenses can be transferred from one establishment to another under the same ownership. They could be opened as any "accessory use" in any place selling food and/or drink for on-site consumption. Three licenses are pending for Ruston Way.
