

Historic District Expansion Complete!

Just in case you weren't aware, the Tacoma City Council voted to complete our historic neighborhood this past April 4. The North Slope Historic District now stretches from North Grant to North I, roughly, between Division and Steele. Not only did they vote to complete the district on that date, but our street signs were installed in time for the May 2000 Historic Preservation celebration! The North Slope Neighborhood Coalition applied for and received an innovative grant to pay for the signs. The art work was donated by one of our neighbors and the city did the installation.


The development has taken close to eight years. Most of that time was spent trying to make sure that every property owner was contacted and asked to support the effort. The City Council meetings,

Historic Preservation

The North Slope Historic District is now complete. The final phase of expansion has passed the City Council with flying colors! This is no small accomplishment; a few die-hard volunteers put in unknown hours to make the NSHD a reality. Everyone in the district, actually, everyone in the city owes these hard workers a big THANK YOU! Not only is the neighborhood a more desirable place to live and the value of the homes increases, the whole city becomes a place of distinction. Distinction derived from having such a large residential historic district.

There are a few vocal people who contend that for something to be declared worthy of "preservation", it should be a major element in a pivotal period, event or connected

to a person who shaped history. The nay-sayers don't want to be bothered by everyday historic details: "Why preserve something if it is not even interesting enough to bother reading about. I am too sophisticated to waste my time on the little details".

I contend that it is the little details that make historic preservation meaningful. The details give the big, showy items perspective and scale, details are the background of the big picture. It is like a fine silk brocade with gold threads. The gold is what draws the attention and comments, but it is all the other threads in the fabric that make the gold so valuable. We need all the warp and welt of our history to truly see the fabric.

The ALBERS MILL preservation fight is the same struggle: big, showy, significant verses the "fabric". Albers Mill is the last remaining shred of fabric of our industrial past on the waterway. The mill can be woven into the new without detracting from the new or the old: they work together and become bigger and better than the sum of the parts. A talented architect working to do the right thing for the good of the community, and not just serving his ego, can overcome the obstacles the profit takers conger up. To tear Albers Mill down because it doesn't fit in with the new is a direct denial of our heritage. Embarrassed by our parents? Get over it, forget the ego and celebrate who we are and where we came from!

The North Slope Historic Neighborhood is alive and well today and celebrating our heritage!

Tacoma Cares/ Minimum Building Code

It's been a year since the Minimum Building and Structures Code went into effect and the results have been positive. Of the 426 sites inspected (residential and commercial), 123 of these have been totally repaired to code. Another 228 are being repaired or have plans for repair. Property owners have demolished 20 buildings and another 53 are under the citation process. As you can tell from the numbers, the code has been a very effective tool for preventing the decay of buildings. We have also been making a very concerted effort to get information out to low-income, elderly and disabled folks about programs available to assist them. Tips for Creating a Safer Home

Thousands of Americans die each year as a result of accidents in their homes. Millions of others, many of them older adults, suffer disabling injuries. The majority of these domestic accidents can be prevented by incorporating the following safety tips in your home:

· Install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms throughout the house and in the garage and be sure to check the batteries regularly. A good rule of thumb is to replace the

batteries each time we change our clocks for daylight savings time/ standard daylight time.

- · Keep fire extinguishers in the kitchen and garage and know how to use them.
- · Never smoke in bed or around combustibles.
- · Do not overload electrical outlets with extension cords and be sure to turn off appliances when they are not in use.

- · Keep flammable material such as curtains, aprons, and dishtowels away from the stove and never wear loose clothing while cooking.
- · Make sure all carpeting and rugs are securely fastened and have no loose corners.
- · Keep hallways and stairs well-lit and free of clutter.
- · Place nightlights in convenient locations.
