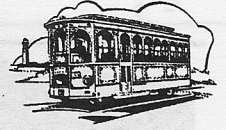

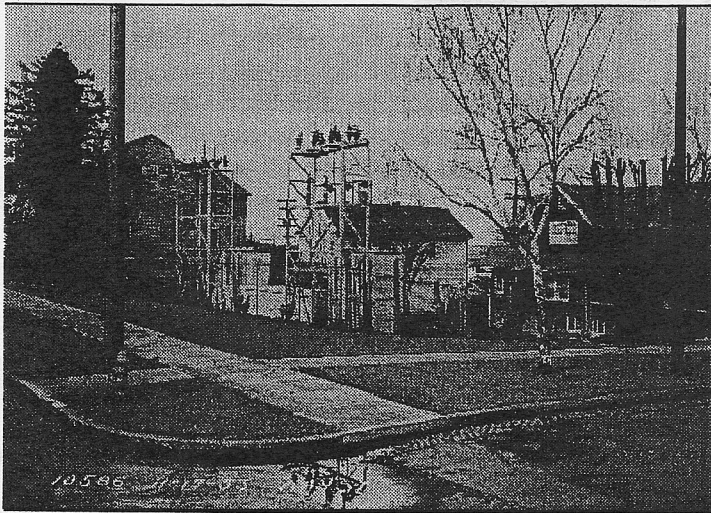

From Distribution Yard to Play Yard Before the Park

Our North Slope Historic District Park is located on a property that Tacoma City Light obtained in November 1951. Tacoma City Light purchased a vacant lot for a "Distribution Yard;" the city was growing and needed more electrical capacity. A photograph taken on November 17, 1953 shows transformers with connecting power lines indicating that the "yard" was ready for service.

The term "Distribution Yard" gave way to "Substation" and the K St. Substation remained in active service until late 1983, according to information obtained from Tacoma Power. When the method of



power distribution changed and the K St. Substation was decommissioned, it sat vacant for years with the transformers still in place, but disconnected. After removing all the power equipment, the lot was still left vacant, on purpose, giving Tacoma City Light time to verify that the land was not contaminated and could be put to other use.

The local residents noted that Tacoma Power (the new name since 1989 for Tacoma City Light) had a vacant lot and wondered what would become of it. There were many discussions on a method, any method, that would prevent another huge apartment complex from being built in the middle of our Historic District. It was Kelly Halligan who suggested a "Pocket Park". That sounded like an excellent idea, but no one could figure out a way to purchase the property. Thea Foss bond money became the solution and source of funds for the purchase of the park.

At last, on July 26, 2000, Tacoma Power approved the sale of the property for \$30,000. According to Curtis Hancock of MetroParks, the City of Tacoma became the owner of the property in April 2001. With the city owning the land, and an agreement that MetroParks would maintain the park, our North Slope Historic District Park was built these last few months.

Park Dedication

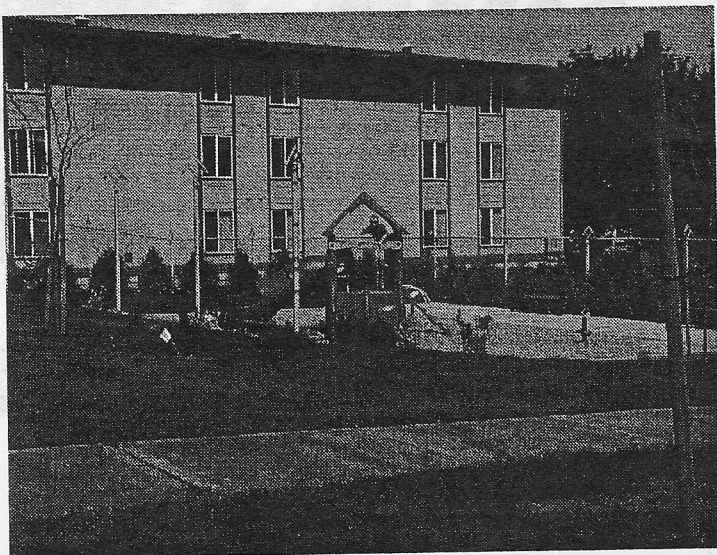
On June 8th at 1:30 p.m. the North Slope Historic District will dedicate the new park at North 8th and K Streets to the late Valerie Sivinski. The former Tacoma Historic Preservation Officer was instrumental in formation of the Historic District, guiding residents through the difficult beginning series of hearings.

Roger Johnson, NSHD representative on the Landmarks Preservation Commission, perhaps puts it best: "We owe a debt of gratitude to Valerie for her infectious enthusiasm for historic preservation and restoration, without which our efforts would have been fruitless. She helped us see the value of all the elements of the neighborhood, from the small modest cottage to the big showplace. Her efforts helped restore not only the homes, but also the neighborhood's pride. Valerie Sivinski brought the North Slope Historic District together as a family with a goal: to preserve the lessons and values of our history."

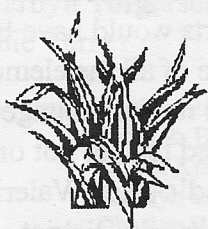
The dedication program is scheduled to begin outdoors at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 8, at the North Slope Historic District Park. Tim McDonald, Valerie's husband, will speak about her. Elizabeth Anderson and Michael Sullivan, two former Historic Preservation Officers, will offer comments. A dedication stone will then be unveiled. This stone, carved and inscribed, is a gift from Tim McDonald to the NSHD Park.

A reception will follow in the Immanuel Presbyterian Church Fellowship Hall, (entrance on North 9th), where refreshments will be served and a picture display will highlight the neighborhood's historic homes. All North Slope residents are cordially invited. There also will be invited guests from around the city and state.

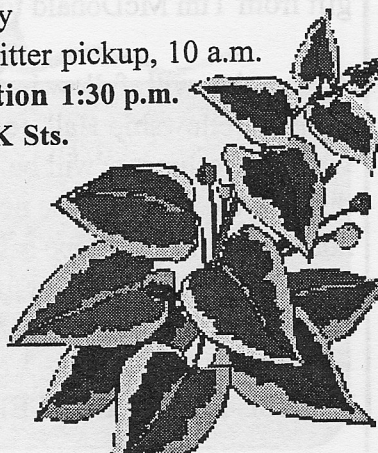

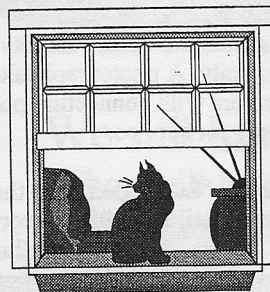

North Slope Historic District Zoning

When zoning was initiated in the 1950s, the lower portion of the current North Slope Historic District was a "throw-away" area, with run-down homes, poor or elderly owners and little pride in appearances. In the 1960s and 70s, a number of homes were razed to build apartments and owners were no doubt glad to get what they could from developers. The three large units in the 800 and 900 blocks of North K were built at this time, as were a number of smaller (12-14 unit) complexes; several more small units were added even in the 1980s.



The building of these large multi-units reflected the R-5 zoning that was assigned to much of the lower part of the current Historic District. At some point, the zoning was changed to R4-L, a category which allows almost anything; most of the other R4-L areas in the city are apartment neighborhoods without significant single-family homes, the exceptions being NSHD and 2 small neighborhoods on the East Side.

The northern portions of the North Slope Historic District (I, J, K, L and parts of M) carry the R4-L zoning designation, while the upper streets of NSHD are R-2SRD. The Steering Committee of the North Slope Historic District feels that R4-L is a category which threatens the future of any house damaged enough to warrant demolition. For instance, the Historic District ordinance doesn't require rebuilding of a single-family home if one burns. The zoning allows a house or up to a 4-plex on a 50 x100 foot lot, albeit the guidelines require building with design criteria spelled out in the Historic District ordinance. Thus, the historic ordinance affords us some protection.

The NSHD Steering Committee has a sub-committee pledged to work on a new city-wide zoning category for "historic neighborhoods." We agreed to wait for the residential zoning review being done city-wide – hopefully completed in 2002. The process has now started, and NSHD will be kept aware of the progress the committee makes.

A new zoning category would need to address the issues that are inherent in the R4-L category which threaten the historic character of the neighborhood. Those issues include lot size for multi-units, off-street parking for at least two vehicles per unit, limiting new conversions without parking provisions, and requiring the replacement of a single-family home, not a multi-unit, if a single-family home is destroyed.

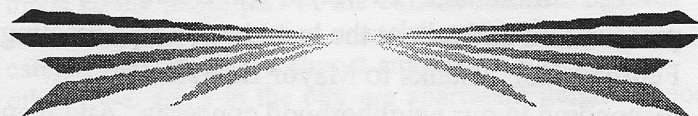
Clean Streets
