Salmon Stickers

Citizens for a Healthy Bay and City of Tacoma Public Works Department are sponsoring a city-wide work party in the North Slope to install salmon stickers by storm drains. The plastic stickers will remind us that what is dumped down drains goes directly to local waterways. These durable curb markers will replace stenciled "don't pollute" warnings, and last longer without fading.

Volunteers will meet at the North 8th & K park at 10 a.m. Saturday, July 20. After receiving instructions, maps, and materials, we will spread throughout the North Slope to place the stickers. There will be a pizza party afterwards, provided by the sponsors. Which ever streets are not done July 20, we will cover later on our own time. About one hundred twenty-five neighbors, friends of Valerie Sivinski, and city officials enjoyed the dedication of our new North Slope park, and the reception afterwards. Following morning showers, the sun came out just in time for the 1:30 p.m. event June 8. Councilman Bill Evans read the city's proclamation of "Valerie Sivinski Day." Park Director Jerry Thorpe



expressed Metro Park's good wishes. Tim McDonald spoke about his wife's interest in historic preservation in Tacoma. Former Historic Preservation Officers Elizabeth Anderson and Michael Sullivan related stories about Valerie and her work. Tim

designed the beautiful memorial made of Tenino and Wilkeson sandstone from Marenakos Rock Center and carved by Keith Phillips of Tenino. As the dedication ended, Tim unveiled the memorial and explained the various titles. If you have not seen the park, stop by to admire the memorial, play area, and landscaping. Valerie was Tacoma's Historic Preservation Officer from 1991 to 1998. She was instrumental in the formation of the North Slope Historic District, and also lived in the neighborhood with her husband, Tim McDonald.

Pasadena & Tacoma A Tale of Two Historic Districts

Pasadena, California has its Bungalow Heaven Historic District. Tacoma has its North Slope Historic District. In reading an article in *Sunset Magazine*, March 2002, I noticed a lot of similarities between the two Districts, as well as differences. I thought I would share this with you.

Both Bungalow Heaven, BH, and our North Slope Historic District, NSHD, had a realestate developer to account for the start. NSHD was galvanized into action when an 8-unit apartment was slated to be built



on North 10th and J Streets. In Pasadena, a developer demolished a 2-story Craftsman bungalow and built, quoting Bob Kneisel from BH, ".... the tackiest apartment houses anyone had ever seen." In our case, neighbors held the size to a "legal" 6 units of a "Gig Harbor" type apartment. It doesn't fit the neighborhood, but there was nothing we could do about it.

People here and in Pasadena realized that more multiunits were coming, these units were legally zoned, and they would be built to the detriment of single-family homeowners. In Pasadena, BH succeeded because they were able to convince the city of the value of the historic character of the neighborhood to accomplish downzoning. Bungalow Heaven has gone on to be a city and nationally recognized historic area. Bungalow Heaven has been featured in magazines, like *Sunset*, as well as in newspapers and books. All this is to the benefit of the neighborhood, as well as to the City of Pasadena.

Here in Tacoma, the city officials have their head in the sand and still envision our historic area as another "apartment city." The R4-L zoning we have <u>allows</u> 100% apartments, and forward planning of the city shows this is the direction they want for our neighborhood. (see <www.wiredcityusa.com> for zoning and intensity maps) A group of NSHD residents have tried to change the zoning since 1994, but has been denied over and over. With this attitude from the city, it

is no wonder we have had little publicity for the historic character and value of our homes, nor for the Historic District itself. And no side benefits that publicity can bring to the City of Tacoma, either. Still, our NSHD has accomplished a lot. New people want to live here and old-time residents are proud to be a part of the North Slope Historic District.

After seeing the need for a historic district, the process followed by BH and NSHD was almost identical. The Historic Preservation Office in both cities became active in helping to get the district formed. In both neighborhoods, dedicated residents worked tirelessly to educate, inform and elicit support from property owners. In October 1989, BH became the first residential district in Pasadena to reach Landmark District status. We in the NSHD became the first residential district in Tacoma on Aug. 1, 1995.

Other similarities come to mind. We both have signs on the lampposts proudly denoting the Districts. NSHD has over 950 properties in the district. BH is a close second, with over 800. In the past we have had Historic Home tours; BH still does, on an annual basis. Both Districts sponsor neighborhood activities, both educational and social. One last item pointed out in the "*Sunset*" article -- having a Historic District gives residents a common purpose and goal, which pulls the neighbors together. This certainly fits the NSHD.

Remember, NSHD is new. There is no such thing as an "old-timer!" Get out, becoma a part, volunteer, do a little, do a lot.

I wonder, NSHD is ready for *Sunset Magazine;* is Tacoma?

Innovative Grants Program

by Ralph Tomberg The North Slope Historic District submitted three grant requests under the 2002 Innovative Grant Program. These were for crosswalks at North 8th & K by our new park, "No Parking Here to Corner" signs at various intersections, and for streetlights on North Cushman. The North End Neighborhood Council declined to approve any of these grants for funding. Thanks to all of you who worked to submit these grants, and better luck next year!

Instead, the NENC approved funding the following five projects: parking lot refurbishment at Gonyea Boys & Girls Club \$5000, Puget Creek salmon restoration \$3718, Tacoma's First Working Waterfront \$5000, Legacy of Croatian People \$5000, and Marvin Klegman memorial fund \$5000.



Furniture Polish

Greener, cleaner furniture polish: Mix 1/2 tsp. olive oil and 1/4 cup vinegar or lemon juice in a bowl. Dab a soft rag into the solution and dust, polish and shine your wooden furniture with it. You can use the rag over and over again. (www.cityoftacoma.org/solidwaste/landfill/ alternatives)



When you wash your car on pavement, the soap and oily grit go into storm drains, and flow directly into lakes, streams, and Commencement Bay. This pollutes our waterways. So, instead, wash your car on grass or gravel where the bad stuff is filtered out so it can't harm the ground water. Or, go to a car wash that recycles its wash water.
