SALUTE: Jay & Julie Turner

Everyone should thank his lucky stars because Jay and Julie Turner live in the North Slope Historic District! Thanks to them we now live in a nationally recognized historic district!

Jay and Julie were the spark plugs, the fuel and the drivers of the machine that created and submitted the nomination forms to the Washington State Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. The state office added our neighborhood to the Washington Heritage Register and recommended the NSHD to the federal government to be added to the National Historic Register in February 2003!

The whole process began over 10 years ago with the idea of a historic designation to help preserve our neighborhood. Some fine old homes had been torn down and replaced with ugly apartments. They add nothing to the neighborhood; in fact, they lower the property values and serve as a cancer on the neighborhood. For a while, the cancer made us all suffer with an increase in crime and drug activity. We have battled the sickness, and one of the cures is Historic Preservation which fosters pride!

In 1994, Julie seized upon the historic preservation "cure" and ran with it. The North Slope Historic District was officially created with the passage of a Tacoma city ordinance. Jay took up the mantle of Historic Preservation, the preservation for our neighborhood's quality of place and life. He never let up until the Federal Government declared our neighborhood a National Historic District!

Now it is our turn! On May 6, the State Of Washington Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation is awarding Jay and Julie Turner a Special Achievement Award.

Everyone should come be a part of the ceremony and show our thanks to Jay and Julie. A bonus is that the event is being held at the Knights of Pythias Hall! The historic hall has to be seen to be believed. (Finding the Pythias Hall can be a challenge: It is across the street from Tacoma Actor's Guild. The entrance is a worn wooden door and the hall is up a long set of stairs.)

In addition to the award for the Turners, other awards of interest will be for saving and restoring Albers Mill, and the Valerie Sivinski Award for Outstanding Restoration goes to the Port Stanley Schoolhouse on Lopez Island and the O'Rear House at Port Townsend.

Were you aware of the meth house on North 6th Street? In March, the police barricaded the rental property, and the owner has been having it cleaned. Because of neighborhood concern about this meth lab, it will be the center of discussion at our next North Slope meeting.

So that families with young children can attend, we will offer babysitting in the church school rooms during the meeting.

Landmarks Group Adds Another North Sloper

Timothy McDonald, a retired architect who owns a home on North M Street, was appointed to the Landmarks Commission on April 5, 2004. He joins long-time commissioner Roger Johnson, who lives on North J Street and who started out as the ex officio North Slope Historic District representative; Johnson is now a full commissioner.

Mr. McDonald has lived in the North Slope for about 15 years, and was most recently active as the designer and donor of the stone monument at the North Slope Historic District Park.


"I will be alert to be sure the NSHD is protected, but I will also be helping to further historic preservation throughout the City of Tacoma," says Mr. McDonald.

The Landmarks Commission is charged with the job of encouraging the preservation of historic properties in the city, and plays a major role in protecting the North Slope Historic District through oversight of the guidelines for remodeling and new construction. This oversight is designed to protect the architectural integrity of the historic structures in our historic district.

Plaques for Sale

From the Archives

This information comes from the Archives of the National Historic Register:

The American Foursquare style house at 1402 North 5th was built in 1903 for Ernest Lister, who was later Washington State Governor. The house, with a wrap around porch, faces both North 5th and Sheridan Streets.

Lister came to Tacoma from England in 1884. He was an iron molder, and then partnered with his brother in construction, real estate, insurance, and lumber. He served on Tacoma City Council at age 23.

While Governor in 1919 he suffered a collapse, and died at age 48 of heart and kidney disease. His wife died five years later, and both his children died young, at age 27 and 30.
