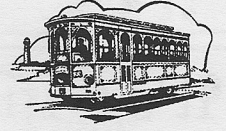

Calling All Amateur Artists!

Would you like to be part of a work party to beautify our kiosk at North 6th & K Streets? The North Slope has received an innovative grant for Lynn DiNino to refurbish our kiosk as she did the four downtown Tacoma ones last year. Lynn has recently organized the "Suitcase Sightings", a series of 100 suitcases embellished by local artists and now located in many local businesses. Last summer she invented the "Red Door Project". She also planned the "Figure Head Roll" of 1000 heads rolling down a Tacoma street during New Year's Eve First Night celebration.

Lynn DiNino will work on the kiosk Sunday, August 7 and Monday, August 8. She will need helpers to paint and attach the rubber backing on both days. The kiosk will be painted yellow and green, our North Slope logo colors. The North 6th & K corner will be much improved.

Next Meeting: Drought Resistant Gardening

Tacoma summers can be extraordinarily dry. For example, from May 1 to Nov. 1, 2002, it rained just 4.6 inches at SeaTac. Imagine you'd planted a new hybrid rhododendron that April. They require about an inch of water per week - ideally consuming about 24 inches from May through October. Since fewer than 5 inches of rain fell that summer, the rhododendron needed about 20 extra inches from irrigation. Would you have known - or taken the time - to provide that much water? Northwest gardens and gardeners need sensible plant choices that will manage summer dryness without needing much irrigation. With water costs going up and a growing population that just keeps demanding "more," it's comforting to know you can grow plants suited to water realities. Anna Thurston, a member of the City of Tacoma's Water Conservation team, will attend the North Slope's July 23 meeting to provide information about plant selection, grouping plants, soaker hoses, soil preparation tips that can help retain water, and much more. Whether you're a casual gardener or were born with a green thumb, you're bound to learn something from this terrific neighborhood program.

National Night Out

On Tuesday, August 2, the North Slope Historic District will join with almost 10,000 communities from all 50 states, Canada, and military bases around the world to celebrate "National Night Out - America's Night Out Against Crime."

National Night Out is designed to:

- *Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness.
- *Generate support for anti-crime efforts.
- *Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships.
- *Send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

The North Slope's gathering begins at 6 p.m. at our North 8th & K park, and will include a dessert potluck. We'll supply plates, napkins and flatware - just bring an appetite and something to share. Children will thrill at getting an up-close look at a visiting fire truck and police car. We'll provide crime prevention materials and information about the NSHD.

We're hoping for sunshine, but in the event of rain the North Slope's National Night Out event will be held at Immanuel Presbyterian Church, 901 North J.

It's Official, Now What?

In December 2003 the North Slope Historic District incorporated as a nonprofit in the state of Washington. This year the NSHD was recognized as a 501(c)(3) organization by the Internal Revenue Service. This means that donations made to the NSHD are tax deductible, depending on the donor's tax status.

For about ten years the NSHD had operated with an informal steering committee. Various participants during those years had discussed the advantages of a more formal organization. It was decided that the time had come to admit that the NSHD neighborhood would benefit as a recognized nonprofit, thus allowing the Board of Directors to involve the NSHD in more activities for the neighborhood. As a legal entity and 501(c)(3), the NSHD is eligible for grants, but the application process must still be completed by an individual.

Members of the Steering Committee were identified as the organizing board of directors for the corporation and served for a year. An election was held in February 2005 to determine who will serve on the board for the two-year term. All residents and property owners in the NSHD are voting members of the organization. Any resident or property owner is eligible to run for a seat on the board. As a resident or owner you may bring concerns or possible projects to the board. If you wish to attend a board meeting, or be on the agenda, call the president. The meetings are at 7 p.m. the fourth Wednesday of odd-numbered months.

One reminder about the rules for a 501(c)(3) organization: the organization may not participate in political campaigns. This does not mean that individuals who are members of the board can not participate and support candidates of their choice. Members of the Board must make it clear that they are not representing the NSHD, but are presenting their own views. This is an important point for the NSHD because it is established to promote, educate others, and support historic preservation in the NSHD, Tacoma, the state, and in general. The organization is allowed to hold candidates' forums for all candidates running for a specific office.

In 1892 builder Lemuel Root planned to construct eight 2-story residences on North K Street, and two on North J for \$2700 each. Two houses remain, at 903 and 911 North K. The Queen Anne homes have a front facing gambrel roof extending over a front balcony. The upper level has dual multi-paneled transoms over picture windows.

Zoning Update

The Public Works Committee is working to remove a few leftover pieces of the old R4-L zoning which are still in the new zone, MR-SRD, so the Historic District can be under ONE zoning category, not the two we currently have. One zone, with the wording that recognizes and supports our historic status, is the request the Board has made in our 2005 application to the City for a zoning change. One zone cannot be accomplished without two modifications to the current MR-SRD.

Property owners in the North Slope Historic District will be receiving notification of the Planning Commission hearing in July; the hearing will be on August 3, at 5 pm in the City Council Chambers. The Board urges all residents to attend to support the unification of the District; residents need not speak, just attend and be counted as supporters.

The new zone, with "historic" protections, now covers only North I, J, K, L and M Streets; the Board is asking the City to extend coverage to the rest of the NSHD. The zone is called Mixed Residential Special Review District. It was developed last year by City planners and our committee, and went into effect on 12/31/2004. It prohibits new construction of more than 2 units, (three if a large enough lot is available), and includes wording that requires the City to consider the historic nature of our structures when making decisions related to zoning.

Currently, in the MR-SRD area, a list of larger special-needs

housing facilities are allowed to be sited in any apartment house of 4 or more units. These facilities are for up to 16 residents, as well as over 16 residents in the larger buildings. Examples of these facilities include emergency and transitional housing, community care facility, extended care facility and retirement homes.

"The position of the Public Works Committee is that these facilities need sites larger than our old streets and historic streets can provide," says Julie Turner, Public Works Chair. "The 2005 zoning request asks for removal of these uses, as well as for placement of wireless communication devices on apartment roofs."

There will be 2 hearings where removal of these uses will be decided. The first hearing is AUGUST 3, 5 PM, CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS.

IT WILL BE CRUCIAL FOR MANY OF US TO ATTEND, and BE A PRESENCE TO SUPPORT THE BOARD MEMBERS SPEAKING TO THE IMPORTANCE OF CLEANING UP MR-SRD SO WE CAN UNITE THE DISTRICT. PLEASE COME ON AUGUST 3.

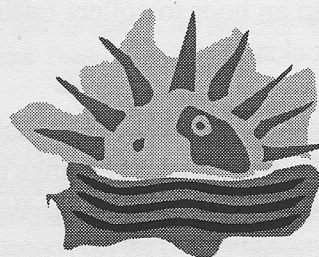
