Call Before You Hammer

Some NSHD property owners recently have faced fines or "stop work" orders from the city for inappropriate work on their houses.

To avoid this on your next project, remember that almost any change to the exterior of your house or garage (other than painting and minor repair) requires a building permit and design review by the Landmarks Commission. This includes changing or replacing windows, changing siding (such as re-shingling), or adding, replacing or changing a porch. Contractors often do not know the rules that apply in NSHD. Before starting any exterior work, it's a good idea to contact Tacoma's Historic Preservation Officer Reuben McKnight at Reuben.McKnight@ci.tacoma.wa.us or 591-5220. He can quickly tell you if your project will require permits and design review.

The North Slope is protected by its designated historic status only as long as we follow the rules that maintain its integrity.

Sidewalk Replacement

In Tacoma, property owners are responsible for maintaining the public sidewalks along their property. Our collective taxes through the city pay for half of the replacement of damaged sidewalks, but individual property owners pay the rest, which at \$4.50/SF can still be a sizeable fee. That cost is greater if the homeowner wants the "historic" option: lampblack added to the concrete for a dull gray look and scoring in a checkerboard pattern. The historic option is not required in the North Slope, but many residents prefer it and are surprised at its cost mentioned in city mailings.

Asst. Public Works Director Craig Sivley says the cost quoted in mailings is a conservative estimate provided by the city. The city no longer provides the historic option but allows homeowners in historic districts to negotiate independently with its contractor for this option. That negotiated price may be substantially less than the city's estimate. If you want the historic option when your sidewalk is replaced, select that option on the provided form and then expect to negotiate its price. You can always opt for the standard option if you don't like the price the contractor offers.

City Not Picking Up Leaves

The City of Tacoma is no longer picking up piles of leaves. Instead, property owners must dispose of leaves by:

- Composting them to use as mulch.
- Disposing of them in your brown yard waste container,
- Taking them to the landfill.

According to www.compostguide.com, you can make compost out of leaves in as little as 14 days by doing these things:

- 1. Shred or grind the leaves.
- 2. Mix four parts ground leaves with one part manure or other nitrogen-rich material.
- 3. Turn the heap every three days.

The leaves of one large tree can be worth as much as \$50 of plant food and humus. Pound for pound, the leaves of most trees contain twice as many minerals as manure.

Remember: fallen leaves can clog up city storm drains and cause neighborhood streets to flood. Please do your part to prevent flooding by raking or sweeping leaves out of storm drains near your home. For more information, visit www.cityoftacoma.org/flood. To report street flooding, call 591-5585.
