Mayor Bill Baarsma will speak with residents at





Woodman, Spare That Tree!

This neighborhood features houses built by Washington's leading architects that became home to some fairly famous people. However, the North Slope is home to another treasure – one I didn't even know about until I was taking Geoff's dad on a walking tour of the North Slope.

While I was expounding on Ambrose Russell's incredible design of the Murray House at Division and North Sheridan, Mr. Corso, a retired biology teacher and master gardener, was down the block, pointing to the tree in front of 417 N. Sheridan. "Look at the size of that chestnut!"

It turns out that the tree is indeed very special. It is registered as the second largest American chestnut in Washington. The American chestnut's natural range is the Eastern United States where it was very common until the chestnut blight was introduced from China or Japan sometime between 1900 and 1908. By 1940, the American chestnut was almost extinct. This one was probably planted and owes its growth to the Northwest's rainy climate. We can add this natural wonder to the architectural and historic wonders in our neighborhood. – *Marshall McClintock*

Christmas Tree Disposal

Wondering how to recycle your Christmas tree? Solid Waste Management will pick up your tree at no additional charge with your yard waste at the curb until Jan. 19.

To prepare for curbside pickup:

- Remove all decorations and tinsel.
- Take tree out of the stand.
- Cut tree/limbs into 3 ft. or less lengths & bundle with heavy twine.
- Place on curb next to your yard waste container.

Flocked trees or trees with decorations or stands will not be picked up! Dispose of flocked trees in the garbage or at the Tacoma Landfill.

Trees from apartment and businesses may be brought to thee landfill and disposed of at no charge Dec. 26 to Jan. 21. Apartment managers or landlords who collect tenants' trees may drop them off all at once; call 591-5543 in advance of drop off.

L Street Light Update

Most of North L Street currently has cobra-style

streetlights that don't match the rest of the North Slope or the historic character of the neighborhood, but that may be changing.

Because the city soon has to replace the lights on L as part of their regular upkeep, property owners have been given the option of upgrading



to historic-style lampposts. Through the city's LID (Local Improvement District) process, the city canvassed property owners to ask what to do about the lights; the majority approved the historic upgrade.

The next step in the process is a hearing at 5 p.m. Dec. 11 in city council chambers, at which city staff will hear from those affected by the LID. The North Slope Historic District Board encourages L Street property owners to attend this hearing. The hearing committee will make a recommendation to the city council. If approved, the lighting project could begin as early as summer 2007.

Although the LID requires neighbors to pay for part of the project, the improvement of the streetscape will have a positive impact on L and the entire neighborhood. The cost for property owners varies depending on the property size, but for many, the amount, over 10 years, amounts to around \$50 per year. Although it may seem like the city should cover the entire cost of street lighting, as with streets in Tacoma, it was the residents along the street who originally paid for this service. The city is only responsible for upkeep.

For those who don't think historic preservation is worth the extra cash, consider this:

A landmark study from Rutgers University in 1998, "The Contributions of Historic Preservation to Housing and Economic Development," found that investments in historic rehabilitation across the United States provide significantly greater benefit for a community than equal investments in car manufacturing in Michigan or coal mining in West Virginia.

Additionally, if the LID process continues and is ultimately approved, the North Slope Historic

District, as a non-profit organization, can seek grant money to help defray the cost of the lighting project. If the LID is not approved, grants will be hard to win, and the city will likely not allow the project to take place anyway if the neighbors aren't on board. The L Street LID process is an important opportunity for historic rehabilitation along a street in the heart of one of Washington State's largest historic districts.


