Beloved Butterfly Bush: A Noxious Weed

The Pierce County Noxious Weed Control Board, (PCNWCB), <u>www.piercecountyweedboard.wsu.edu</u> has elevated the priority of Buddleja davidii and its cultivars (our beloved butterfly bushes) to a class "B" noxious weed and is encouraging property owners to control it because it's escaping our gardens and displacing native plants in the Puget Sound region.

Buddleja davidii is from China and Japan. The French and English exported the shrub to Europe in the late 1800s, and the English exported it to the U.S. around 1900.

If you have B. davidii, including any of its cultivars, the Pierce County Noxious Weed Control Board requests your help:

- Dig up the shrub including the roots and dispose of it with your yard waste.
- If you can't dig up the shrub by the roots, cut the shrub down to the ground and paint the fresh wound with concentrated glyphosate (Round-Uptm) herbicide.
- If you can't bring yourself to destroy your butterfly bush, remove the flowerheads when they turn brown (before October) and dispose of them with your yard waste because each flowerhead has the potential to produce approximately 40,000 seeds.
- If you want to replace your B. davidii, consider
 B. alternifolia, B. colvilei, B. globosa, or a native shrub such as an Elderberry, Huckleberry,
 Oceanspray, Kalmia, etc.

If you're not sure whether a shrub in your garden is a B. davidii or one of its cultivars:

- Wait until it blooms.
- Call the PCNWCB (253) 798-7263 or the Pierce County Cooperative Extension Office (253) 798-7180 to make an appointment to identify your shrub.
- Cut off a branch and take it to the office for identification.

Living in the North Slope

Congratulations! You own a home in a unique neighborhood. Not only is the North Slope Historic District a city, state, and national historic district, it is also the 2nd largest residential historic district west of the Mississippi. You enjoy such perks as prestige and higher property values as a result of residing in the NSHD.

With perks, however, come some responsibilities. You are a steward of a historic structure. The NS wouldn't be a historic district if homeowners were replacing original siding with aluminum, original windows with vinyl, or tearing off original porches to add decks. These are a few examples of why we have a design review process through the Landmarks Commission. The focus is on preserving our existing historic homes. As a homeowner, in a historic district, you give up some of your individual rights for the collective good of the community.

An example of a recent application to the Landmarks Commission may help illustrate. New owners of a house on N. Sheridan tore out all of the original windows and replaced them with illfitting vinyl windows. They were reported by a neighbor and required to make a retroactive application for design review. Landmarks denied the retroactive application for the installation of vinyl windows and asked that windows which met the North Slope design guidelines be installed (vinyl is an incompatible material for a historic home). The owners appealed the decision, which triggered a hearing before an administrative law judge. The Landmarks decision was upheld and the owners are being required to replace the vinyl windows with windows that meet the design guidelines.

It has been my experience as a Landmarks commissioner that retroactive applications are always a result of neighbors reporting violations. Thus, it seems that most of us would like to preserve the original historic fabric of our homes even though it may restrict what individuals are allowed to do to the exterior of their houses. Creation of the NSHD was a grassroots effort by the residents who live here, not something imposed upon us by the City of Tacoma. Our residents fought long and hard, and put in countless hours of documenting, testifying, meeting, and working the political process to get our historic status and the zoning that went with it.

As homeowners who benefit from living in a historic district let's protect the historic materials we have left in our community that make it such a special place. You can start by reviewing the NS design guidelines available at
