Ask the North Slope House Doctor

Q: Can I remove asbestos siding from my house or

do I have to hire an abatement company?

A: Homeowners can legally remove asbestos siding from "an owner occupied, single family home."

You'll need a state permit (\$25) and a city permit (contact Reuben McKnight at 591-5220 and he can give you more information). Washington State's Puget Sound Clean Air Agency also has an excellent 16-page guide on how to remove asbestos siding yourself, including information about state permits, how to tell if your siding has asbestos (not all cement board does), and the best removal options. It's available at www.pscleanair.org and on the NSHD website.

Be forewarned that asbestos siding removal is a messy job and potentially hazardous to your health if not done correctly. However, on the positive side, often the original siding is still underneath the newer siding and is usually in very good shape as it's been protected over the years.

Call Before You Hammer



Exterior changes to your house or garage, other than painting and minor repair, must be reviewed by the Tacoma Landmarks Commission. This includes:

- Changing or replacing windows
- Changing siding
- Adding, replacing or changing a porch or deck.

Before starting any exterior work, contact Reuben McKnight, our city Historic Preservation Officer (591-5220) or email:

(Reuben.McKnight@ci.tacoma.wa.us). He can tell you if your project needs a design review and how to proceed if it does.

Our Park and Beautification Committee was busy during 2008. Altogether they spent 15 hours combing the neighborhood for litter, filling 18 grocery-size bags, and 64 hours planting, weeding, pruning and mulching traffic circles and the park.

Our thanks also goes out to Immanuel Presbyterian Church and John Sandstrom who have adopted N. I St. and N. J St. respectively through the Tacoma Cares program and conduct litter patrols at least semiannually. 
also to Jay Turner, who negotiated with Metro Parks for a long-sought-after picnic table.

Prevent Street Flooding

Each year, Tacoma gets about 40 inches of rain, with nearly 4 inches of it falling within just 24 hours. When that much rain comes down that fast – the City's stormwater system can get overwhelmed and some city streets and low areas can flood.

What can you do about street flooding? If your street is flooding, it is usually caused by a storm drain that is covered with leaves, plastic bags or other debris.

The City Streets and Grounds department suggests using a rake, broom or blower to regularly remove debris from the street storm drain grate near your home or business. With more than 17,000 storm drains to manage, the City can't get to them all during heavy rains – citizens must do their part. If the storm drain in your street is clear and there is still street flooding, call the City Sewer Utility Department at (253) 591-5585.
