

OUR PARK: 10 YEARS OLD!

The North Slope Historic District will celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the North Slope Historic District Park on June 8th.

It's hard to believe that 10 years has passed since our neighborhood group finished work on securing the land, planning the tot-lot park, watching the construction and doing weeding, watering—and more weeding and watering! Lots of work to convert an old electrical sub-station into a park for playing and relaxing.

It all started in the mid-1990s, with Kelly Halligan's persistent suggestion: A park on the old electric sub-station property at North 8th and K Sts. instead of another apartment building. The Steering Committee of the North Slope Neighborhood Coalition took up her idea and broached the park plan to the North End Neighborhood Council, (NENC), which had \$750,000, part of the Thea Foss Bond money, to use on capital projects.

Bill Johnston and Dan Klein, North Slope representatives on NENC, worked hard to negotiate the \$100,000 needed to remove gravel and dirt from the sub-station, and buy and build a tot-lot at North 8th and K. Sts. North Slope residents went to many meetings to vote for the park, vote for the name, and support Bill and Dan's efforts.

Valerie Anne Sivinski Inspired North Slope Residents in the 1990's

The North Slope Historic District Park is 10 years old and it is dedicated to Valerie Sivinski because of her foresight and guidance in establishing the NSHD. It is time we remember Valerie again. The entire North Slope was in jeopardy and we citizens seemed at a loss as to how to protect and improve our neighborhood.

Valerie suggested and guided us in establishing an Historic District to protect the homes and to instill a neighborhood pride; not as individuals but as a neighborhood. It has been successful and a model for other neighborhoods to emulate.

In the middle of our NSHD was an under-utilized Tacoma Power substation that contributed nothing to the spirit of the historic district. Tacoma Power abandoned the substation and the corner lot was a target for apartment building developers. After a long procedure it was deeded to Metro Parks and dedicated to Valerie. The park has turned out to be a bright cheerful place for families with small children but also a gathering place for the entire neighborhood. The park is a reminder of the spirit of our predecessors desire for a safe, friendly neighborhood. It is a symbol of a neighborhood pulling together to create something for everyone, it is a reminder of a less complicated past but also a beacon for a bright future. Everyone should visit the park and experience the spirit and glad tidings of the outdoors, the interesting plants and happy playful children. The best of the past is present in the park.

An informal gathering of original park and historic district workers, all acquaintances of Valerie Sivinski, will occur at the park on June 8th, 2012.

The funds were finally awarded and the long effort began to get the property transferred from Tacoma Public Utilities to the City. The plans were ready, having been decided upon by a committee of residents in consultation with Metro Parks, the managing agency – but we had no land transfer! It finally took intervention by City Manager Jim Walton to save the day by expediting the land transfer. Late in 2001, work at last began!

The Steering Committee had voted to dedicate the park to the late Valerie Sivinski, the Tacoma Historic Preservation Officer who mentored residents during the formation of the Historic District, and whose guidance and professional advice was instrumental in its formation.

“Valerie taught us our neighborhood’s place in history,” says Julie Turner, leader of the historic district formation. “She believed that saving the early homes of Tacoma’s ordinary people is just as important as saving large buildings. Val insisted that we in the North Slope should be grateful that we can walk in the footsteps of Tacoma’s pioneers,” continues Turner.

The park was named by Tim McDonald, Valerie’s husband, who chose “North Slope Historic District Park.” He generously designed, planned and paid for a memorial stone, placed at the park and unveiled at a dedication held on a sunny afternoon, June 8th, 2002.

Dozens of NSHD residents have volunteered their time and money landscaping and maintaining the NSHD Park. Most noteworthy is Nick Kristensen who donated most of the original plants, and has volunteered the greatest number of hours landscaping and maintaining the park. In addition, the NENC recently awarded NSHD, Inc. a grant to refresh the landscaping because freezing temperatures during the past 4 winters killed some of the original plants.

The Job Carr Family - Part One


Who was Job Carr, and where did he come from? Or, as a child visiting the Job Carr Cabin Museum asked, "Why should I care about Job Carr?" Well, since most of the property in the North Slope Historic District was on Job's farm and orchard, we should care. What is the Job Carr story?

In 1635, nineteen year old Caleb Carr and his older brother were sent on a ship from London, England, to their uncle William in New England. As Quakers, they hoped for a better life in America. Before his untimely death by drowning in 1695, Caleb became governor of the colony of Rhode Island. His son Samuel died one year before him. Samuel's son Job was born on the Carr estate in Jamestown, RI in 1689. Job's son Caleb married Sarah Ridgeway in Little Egg Harbor, NJ. Their son, Job, was born there in 1750. In 1778, this Job Carr was disowned by the Burlington Quaker monthly meeting for "learning art of war." He was a colonel in the Revolutionary War and an aide to George Washington. Job's wife, Catherine Smith, was from Ohio.

The Encyclopedia of American Quaker Genealogy, V. 5 (Ohio) states: "On September 7, 1806, Job, son of Job and Catherine, Warren County, OH, married, at Miami, OH, Ruth Mason, daughter of James and Rebeckah." In 1813, Ruth and her three children were granted a certificate to Great Egg Harbor, NJ monthly meeting. A son, Job, was born in Little Egg Harbor, NJ, on July 2, 1813. Three years later, Ruth and Job and their (4) children returned to Ohio.

From Abstracts of the Society of Friends in Indiana, V. 2: "On October 2, 1840, Job, Jr., Camden, Jay County, son of Job and Ruth, Wayne County, married Rebecca, daughter of Anthony and Margaret Pittman at Camden monthly meeting." Anthony Pitman had come to Ohio from New Jersey in 1803, when he was five years old.

His daughter Rebecca was born in 1822 in St. Clairsville, OH. By 1840, Anthony and Margaret Vail Pitman had settled in Indiana with their family. Job and Ruth Carr had also come to Indiana from Ohio.


Job and Rebecca Vail Pitman Carr lived in Indiana and raised their family. Their children were: Anthony Pitman, born June 8, 1841, Francis Howard, born November 25, 1846, Marietta Elizabeth, born March 19, 1849, and Margaret Ann, born November 3, 1850. Both Rebecca and Job had strong personalities, as shown in the reprimands for "disunity" and non-attendance at Quaker meetings. It was an exciting time, with anti-slavery and women's rights actively advocated by the Carrs and other Friends in the 1840s and 1850s. In the 1860s, middle-aged and with grown children, life for this couple was about to change completely.

- Adding, replacing or changing a porch or deck.

Tacoma Historical Society Tour of Homes Coming May 5th and 6th, 2012.






Courtyard of Christ Episcopal Church

Yard Waste is BROWN and Recycle Waste is BLUE





It can make our waters unsafe for humans and other animals. So Please, do your part. Scoop the poop whenever you can—in your back yard, on the sidewalk, at a playground, or at a park.
